### Number of pupils and pupil premium pupils

Total number of pupils on roll	116

### Context of Pupil Premium pupils

- 31% Reception Pupil premium, 18 out of 58 children, 8 girls and 10 boys
- 38% Year 1 Pupil premium, 22 out of 58 children, 7 girls and 15 boys
- No PP are LAC.
- 7 have special educational needs.

## Summary of PPG spending

### **Objectives in spending PPG:**

- To provide support for vulnerable children through EWO and SENDCo to enable them to fully access the curriculum and learning opportunities at school, including where they require SEN support or short term intervention.
- To provide additional support in the classroom for Maths, Writing, Reading, Speech & Language, EAL support, play experiences, social skills to ensure good progress.
- To provide high quality resources to enable eligible children to improve progress and close the gap against their peers.
- To provide all eligible pupils and their families with family support, and pastoral services as and when needed.
- To offer a Breakfast Club for targeted children.
- To enable all eligible pupils to access a wide range of enrichment activities
- To provide 'fast track' Speech & Language Therapy.
- To provide milk for eligible children each school day
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### **Summary PPG actual spending:**

#### **Support for vulnerable children through EWO and SENDCo to enable them to fully access the curriculum and learning opportunities at school, including where they require SEN support or short term intervention.**

Subsidised EWO to support with attendance and lateness,

Subsidised SENDCo support from Sidney stringer to Support PP SEN provision. Deployment of SENDCo time to track and support provision and its impact for targeted children.

Cost: £2000

#### **Outcome**

Persistent absence of PP pupils has reduced and 93% of PP pupils have attendance of 90% or more.

80% of PP pupils have attendance of 95% or more

One-page profile targets for SEN PP children are smart and 95% achieved targets by end of year.

#### **To provide additional support in the classroom for Maths, Writing, Reading, Speech & Language, EAL support, play experiences, social skills to ensure good progress.**

Subsidised the employment of support staff who provided targeted intervention across EYFS and Year 1.

Ensure targeted children have additional high quality teaching in small groups, 1:1 and through booster classes

PP children had additional reading sessions from LSAs, teachers and volunteers through the week.

LSAs had focused time with PP children in class to support with learning or used this time to work with the child 1-1 to tailor the learning to the child's specific needs.

Cost: £14000

#### **Outcome**

Average points progress of PP children in EYFS overall equalled the progress of non PP children. However a higher % of PP children made rapid progress in EYFS in all individual areas excluding maths and the % of PP making expected or better progress was higher than non PP children in all areas. On average 6% of PP children exceeded the early learning goals equalling the attainment of non PP children.

1 child joined SSP in early June 1 week before the EYFS profile was submitted. Without this child 66.6% of PP children achieved GLD compared to 66.1% for non PP children.

#### **High quality resources to enable eligible children to improve progress and close the gap against their peers.**

Targeted resources for developing ICT use across the school purchased. Subscriptions such as Education city and Purple mash and other identified software purchased. All PP children had use of individual ipad.

Cost: £1000

**Outcome**

All PP children had opportunity to use ipads and ICT as an integral part of their learning and had opportunity to practise at lunchtimes.

**All eligible pupils and their families provided with family support, and pastoral services as and when needed. Breakfast Club offered for targeted children**

Subsidised part time Child protection officer.

Subsidised before school care. Breakfast Club staff to support eligible pupils.

Cost:3500

**Outcome**

Vulnerable families were well supported. All eligible children were able to fully access every lesson and were "ready to learn"

**All eligible pupils to accessed enrichment activities if they chose.**

Free after school care.

Subsidised school trips. PP children paid half of all costs.

Cost: £4500

**Outcome**

The after school club provided enrichment experiences and all PP children are able to attend visits and trips. 100% of PP children attended other enrichment clubs after school where they were given priority for joining.

**'fast track' Speech & Language Therapy from a private therapist provided**

Private speech and Language therapist worked 1 day a week seeing PP children with speech and language difficulties.

Cost: £4000

**Outcome**

Specific provision needs for all eligible children were identified quickly and actioned so maximising access to the curriculum and ensuring good progress.

**Milk for eligible children provided each school day**

Milk purchased for all PP children

Cost: £720

**Outcome**

All children eligible for Free School Meals had the opportunity each school day to have a carton of milk.
